CHAIR REPORT

2018 was a year in which we challenged ourselves to consider 'What is Queensland Writers Centre's point of difference?'



Over the past few years, opportunities to help writers improve their craft and business skills have multiplied: from international MOOCs and online masterclasses to workshops offered by local bookstores and stationery suppliers. In 2018, during consultations for Queensland's first-ever 10 Year Roadmap for the Arts, Queensland Writers Centre's Management Committee was challenged to look around and ahead and to ask 'What is Queensland Writers Centre's point of difference?'

It's this: community. As a state-wide member-based organisation, Queensland Writers Centre is uniquely placed to nurture a sense of community among Queensland readers, writers and storytellers.

Writing Fridays kicked off this year, bringing writers together at the Queensland Writers Centre office and public libraries in a growing number of regional centres. The new nomination process for the Johnno Awards enabled a wider range of significant contributions to reading and writing in Queensland to be celebrated. Constitutional reform in 2018 has made it easier for regional and rural members to participate in Queensland Writers Centre's governance. Regional Writers Reference Group helps ensure regular productive dialogue among writers in regional centres.

We are increasingly engaging with Q u e e n s l a n d communities through initiatives like Write Life, Writing for Wellbeing and Resilience Writing.

And storytelling is not a niche interest. Societies grow and thrive through stories told and heard, and Queensland Writers Centre is increasingly engaging with Queensland communities through initiatives like Write Life, Writing for Wellbeing and Resilience Writing.

We are proud of what Queensland Writers Centre has achieved in 2018, and look forward to continuing to foster a vibrant culture and community of reading, writing and storytelling in Queensland.

CEO REPORT

2018 was a year of significant change for the Queensland Writers Centre as we strove to adapt to the ever-evolving needs of Queensland's writing community.



What an amazing year 2018 has been. It was my first year as CEO of Queensland Writers Centre - a role that I have relished from the start. It has also been an incredibly busy year as I set out to do the seemingly 'un-writerly' tasks of collating the relevant data around costs and revenue that was vitally needed for QWC to move forward in the changing arts environment. Achieving this enabled me and my team to make more informed choices about what to pursue and how to garner more resources in order to better support our members.

An area of great personal importance to me, both within the organisation and across the sector, is the welfare and benefits of arts workers. My belief in this as a priority was backed by the governance review undertaken with the support of Arts Queensland. I set about conducting a staffing review that is now helping us to improve performance, reach our

goals and think strategically about the remuneration and care of our people.

People really are at the heart of our organisation and this includes staff and members as well as our various partners and stakeholders. Throughout the year I have worked diligently to build QWC's networks with key decision makers and influencers. The strength of these relationships provides the foundation of our organisation and will see us forge ahead in the future.

I made it my goal this year to reach out to members, to get to know them and to find out what they want from their Writers Centre. In doing so, I unexpectedly gained so much for myself. I have met and enjoyed the company of so many of you already and plan to meet even more in 2019.

Finally, we are increasing our engagement with many of the writing groups so we can meet and support more of Queensland's fabulous writers on a personal level.

Queensland Writers Centre is a not-for-profit membership organisation that has been supporting, celebrating and showcasing Queensland writers, and writing in all its forms, since 1990.

We work with our members and partners to promote a vibrant and diverse writing community across Queensland. As the leading support and resource centre for writers and writing in Queensland we offer a comprehensive range of online and in-person services. We aim to provide information and advice for anyone interested in writing, whatever their level of experience or ambition.

Our members are published authors. emerging writers. children's authors and illustrators, screenwriters. journalists, editors, agents, publishers, poets, storytellers, playwrights, producers, freelance cultural writers, teachers, academics and critics. We strive to support every member and provide them with opportunities to write, publish and create. We are the caretakers of Queensland's community of writers - maintaining, upgrading and introducing members to a web of connections that would otherwise go unknown.

Queensland Writers Centre is part of the National Writers' Centre Network – Australia's largest network of writers. The network supports and connects writers in all the states and territories of Australia. Together we represent more than 10,000 members and a much broader constituency of early career, emerging and established authors – across all genres, all styles and all parts of Australia.

At Queensland Writers Centre, we work with our members to promote a vibrant and diverse writing community across Queensland.

We work to create sustainable careers for Queensland writers with the assistance of our major partners – the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland and the Australian Government through the Australia Council for the Arts.

Through workshops, seminars, masterclasses and mentorships, as well as pop-up events and writing sessions, we aim to get our members writing great stories and being part of an amazing, diverse community.

At Queensland Writers Centre, we love stories. We love the way they help us to understand and connect with those around us and gain a greater understanding of ourselves. Most importantly, we love the writers who tell the stories and the readers who give them life.

ADAPTABLE



WRITING FRIDAYS

This brilliant new program has seen a growing number of members participating each week at the centre. We have also successfully established two other Writing Friday programs at Helensvale, on the Gold Coast, and Maleny, at the Sunshine Coast.

program follows the Pomodoro technique of time management to get writers writing. It's a truly rewarding program for our members, who see their word count building with each session. It's also rewarding for the staff and volunteers to be involved in a program that sees writing goals become reality with such immediacy. If members can't make it into the centre, they can still request a Pomodoro pack and follow the program on their own. With plans to expand the program further into the regions we hope make the program available to even more members in 2019.

ADAPTABLE

In partnership with Screen Queensland, we launched the 'Adaptable' initiative in late 2018. Twenty-five writers were selected to take part and on the 20th March, 2019 the event became a reality.

The initiative came about as a response to data that shows that in Australia only 10 – 15 per cent of films are adaptations (compared to 60 – 70 per cent in the U.S.). Research commissioned by the Publishers Association and produced by Frontier Economics has shown that films adapted from existing IP, such as books, perform consistently higher due to audience recognition.

We are now eagerly awaiting the response from the Adaptable event as each writer follows their individual journey of adaptation.


FISH BOWL RESIDENCY

This year saw the inaugural recipient of the Fish Bowl Residency, Jasmin McGaughey, take up office within the Queensland Writers Centre. CEO, Lori-Jay Ellis, had been looking at how to use the centre's floor space more efficiently and for the benefit of its membership.

The idea of a residency for writers began to formulate and was quickly turned into a reality. It would offer space, mentorship and the support of the writers' centre staff. Upon completing her residency, Jasmin not only exceeded her writing goals but went on to take up a position with black&write.

WO ARTISTS

The first WQ issue for the year featured illustrations by Shannon Horsfall, an author and illustrator based in Australia but living in fairyland.

In March, issue 260 came out with Katherine Battersby on the cover. Now living in Canada, this acclaimed Australian author and illustrator has been shortlisted for various awards and published in Australia, the USA and China.

Issue 261 featured the work of Ulrike Sturm, a Sunshine Coast artist focused on printmaking. Berlin born Sturm has had her work exhibited in Australia, Germany, Japan, New Zealand, Singapore and the US. Another Sunshine Coast illustrator and author, Sophie Beer, featured later in the year with her colourful images effectively embracing the theme of 'other realms'.



WO BARBED DESIGN

During 2018, Queensland Writers Centre made the decision to place the design of WQ with social enterprise, Barbed Design; Australia's only graphic design studio operating inside a prison. With the aim of breaking the cycle of incarceration, Barbed Design employs talented and enthusiastic prisoners to deliver high quality design services.

The results have been extremely professional and the response from our readers has been heartening.

Our confidence in the team led us to introduce some changes to the WQ format and we will continue to forge ahead with these in 2019.

Bella Campbell and Troy Hunter. Each author received one-onone consultations with Hachette publishers and editors, a meeting with literary agent, Jane Novak, and mentoring from Kim Wilkins. We look forward to hearing about the progress of their work as they continue their journey toward publication.



INDIE PUBLISHING INGRAM SPARK

As part of the Oueensland Writers Centre ethos of representing all Queensland writers, 2018 saw us hosting the inaugural Indie Publishing Forum. The forum brought together major contributors in Australia's writing independent publishing community to participate in sessions intended to advance participants' publishing success. The forum featured speakers including: Robin Cutler, Director of Ingram Spark; Gary Pengelly,

Thorpe Bowker/Books+Publishing; Dennis Jones, Dennis Jones and Associates; Alex Fullerton, Book Coach; Sarah Deasy, Avid Reader Bookshop; Kim Wilkins, Author; and our own CEO, Lori-Jay Ellis. The seminar and panel event featured these publishing industry experts discussing crucial book topics.

It was also a chance to promote Indigenous literacy with \$2 from every ticket sold going toward the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

OUEENSLAND WRITERS CENTRE

GOVERNANCE

In 2018, Queensland Writers Centre implemented governance changes to support the foundation of our organisation for the future.



JOHNNO AWARD

The Johnno Award was revitalised this year and the 'trophy' reimagined in the style of our most treasured object, the book.

Kristina Olsson was unanimously selected to receive the 2018 Johnno Award due to the duration and value of her contributions to the Queensland writing community.

She has worked with Sisters Inside. run programs for Queensland Writers Centre, provided mentoring and generously launched other writers' books and provided support. The Honours list included Alice Owen, Thea Biesheuvel, Sean Mee, Tina Marie Clark and Bel Ellis, who have all done wonderful things for the writing community.



OUR CONSTITUTION

During the course of 2018. Writers Centre Queensland conducted a review of its Constitution and recommended changes to the membership. The Management Committee was overwhelmed with the positive response of members resulting in an almost unanimous vote for the changed Constitution.

The Constitution now permits online voting (essential for an organisation with close to half of its membership in regional areas), simplifies the retirement, nomination and election processes for the Management Committee, striking a balance between stable leadership and continuity, and the need for ongoing rejuvenation.



GOVERNANCE REVIEW

Following a review sponsored by Arts Queensland, Queensland Writers Centre updated its governance processes.

Fourteen priority initiatives in 2018 implemented clearer articulation Committee Management roles and responsibilities, better

CEO succession planning, and new policies and procedures to streamline operations.

Queensland Writers Centre values fiscal accountability, with a focus on cost base responsibility and innovative projects.


Queensland Writers Centre is a key organisation in the smallmedium-sized cultural sector with a membership base over 1700 members.

The following breakdown provides a snapshot of our 2018 financial operations. It is not intended to replace or modify the content of the Centre's independently audited Annual Financial Statements.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Strategies implemented during 2018 ensured greater expense control and foundation building to counteract reduced revenues.

I am pleased to present Queensland Writers Centre Financial Report for the year ended 31 December 2019 on behalf of the Management Committee.

During the year under review, Queensland Writers Centre reported a shortfall of \$60,004 (2017: gain \$4,924) and net cash balances of \$77,141 (2017: \$149,957).

The Balance Sheet reports total assets of \$337,919 (2017: \$241,625) and total liabilities of \$260,778 (2017: \$104,480) with total net assets equating to \$77,141 (2017: \$137,145).

The Income Statement reports revenue of \$630,520 (2017: \$822,234 which includes GenreCon). Revenue was made up of earned income of \$287,193 (2017: \$352,066 which includes GenreCon ticket sales) grants of \$341,962 (2017: \$461,089 which includes QLA and AusCo grant), investment income of \$548 (2017: \$1,798) and sponsorship and fundraising income of \$817 (2017: \$7,281)


Total expenses of \$690,524 (2017: \$817,310) represented a reduction of \$126,786, or 15.5% on the total for the previous year.

Due to a shift in strategy, the State Library of Qld decided to review the way the Queensland Literary Awards are administered which meant a decline in the usual income from this source.

Strategies implemented during 2018 ensured greater expense control and foundation building to counteract reduced revenues from the first quarter of the year. The organisation has budgeted for a small profit in 2019, as changes introduced begin to be realised and their impact felt. The budget is continuous and is monitored monthly.
