

CEO REPORT

During 2019, the Queensland Writers Centre saw a number of projects come to fruition, while more new projects went into planning and will be seen in 2020.



During 2019, the Queensland Writers Centre saw a number of projects come to fruition, while new projects went into planning and will be seen in 2020. Our newest project, 'Telling Our Stories To The World', is an example of the future direction of the Writers Centre and the power of writing and creativity to assist in the creative recovery of communities. It is about our community of writers and people interested in writing. From the Central West and our home state, to national and international friends and partnerships - we are building connections and community.

The year began strongly with the inaugural Adaptable Market Day. Established in partnership with Screen Queensland, Adaptable attracted nearly 250 entries from across Australia. By the end of the year our second intake saw the first international entry received. The 25

shortlisted writers pitched their work to 35 producers, show runners and scriptwriters from around Australia. Two panel events were held with Screen Queensland in discussion with Hoodlum, Fremantle, and Roadshow. Our own panel of writers showcased Queensland Writers Centre members Nick Earls and David Lowe alongside industry writers Vicki Englund and Evelyn Saunders.

The end-of-day networking event saw even more connections made with a resulting seven options and ongoing work on a number of projects. Adaptable has been such a success that it will join forces with Gold Coast Film Festival in its second year and gain exposure to an even wider audience.

The tenth Hachette/QWC Manuscript Development retreat was delivered early in the year at Kooralbyn Resort. This was the final year for the program in its current format, with planning underway for a revised and revitalised program to be delivered in 2020.

A fantastic innovation in 2019 was the introduction of live streamed courses. Utilising technology grants we were able to purchase equipment to make this possible. Live streams

have quickly become very popular as a way for writers who are either unable or prefer not to attend workshops in person. They offer the option of watching via live stream and participating with the presenter through online chat or an inperson live stream manager. The live stream is also available for a week after the date so those who simply can't make it on the day can still have access to a recording of the presentation.

This year was also my first year as director of the GenreCon writers and readers festival. I set out with the intention of creating a more sustainable version of GenreCon that was able to pay writers appropriately for their time. It wasn't an easy task and, along with the steering committee, we learned a lot in a very short time. Over the next year we plan to build on these learnings to create an even better GenreCon in 2021.

CHAIR REPORT

As the peak body for the literary arts in Queensland, Queensland Writers Centre draws together individuals, organisations and groups who care about the stories of our amazing state.



In last year's Annual Report, I highlighted QWC's role in strengthening 'community'. As the peak body for the literary arts in Queensland, QWC draws together individuals, organisations and groups who care about the stories of our amazing state. To foster a vibrant culture of reading, writing and storytelling in Queensland, we work with a huge array of partners: State Library of Queensland, Brisbane Writers Festival, Queensland Poetry Festival, Black & Write, Book Links, Screen Queensland, Queensland Health, local Councils and libraries, nongovernment organisations, and the Writers Centres in other states and territories, to name just a few.

Recent years have brought challenges to many communities in Queensland through extreme weather,

including flooding in the north and west, unusually severe bushfire seasons, and drought. When the media attention moves on, it's easy for a community to feel abandoned, left to struggle with the aftermath of the event and the ongoing economic, social and emotional effects.

That's where stories come in.

In 2019, QWC worked closely with Rotary Longreach, Queensland Health and various local partners to implement 'Telling Our Stories to the World'. This project helped community members of all ages share their diverse experiences of living in western Queensland, and hear back from people touched by their stories in other parts of Queensland, Australia and the world. While in governmentspeak we might talk about community resilience, writing for wellbeing and creative recovery, what it comes down to is sharing; the power of telling our stories, and being heard, and enjoying other people's stories in return.

QWC enables the sharing of many kinds of stories through various media. Highlights of 2019 included GenreCon, our unique celebration of genre fiction; Adaptable, an exciting new partnership with Screen Queensland that has already seen seven works by Queensland writers optioned for screen adaptation; and the launch of our new book club Reading Queensland. Underpinning these high-profile events, we continue to expand our services for writers through our Education, Competition, Publishable and Printable programs, Writing Fridays, Pen & Pixel, WQ magazine, Australian Writers Marketplace and much

2019 IN NUMBERS

2019 was a year of increased participation for Queensland Writers Centre, with particular strength and growth in our Writing Fridays program. Below are the figures regarding participation from all across Queensland.



7003 **PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS**

In 2019, 7003 people participated in Queensland Writers Centre events, courses, and programs to improve their craft and industry knowledge.



303 WRITERS **EMPLOYED**

In 2019, 303 people were commissioned by Queensland Writers Centre as instructors, mentors, event coordinators, writers, editors, etc.



2864 WRITING **PARTICIPANTS**

In 2019, 2864 people took part in Writing Fridays across the state, Queensland Writers Centre residencies and our Rabbit Hole Challenge.



133 BRISBANE **EVENTS**

In 2019, Queensland Writers Centre held 133 events in Brisbane.

OUR STORY

OUR PROFILE

Queensland Writers Centre is a not-for-profit membership organisation that has been supporting, celebrating and showcasing Queensland writers, and writing in all its forms, since 1991.

We work with our members and partners to promote a vibrant and diverse writing community across Queensland. As the leading support and resource centre for writers and writing in Queensland we offer a comprehensive range of online and in-person services. We aim to provide information and advice for anyone interested in writing, whatever their level of experience or ambition.

Our members are published authors, emerging writers, children's authors screenwriters, illustrators, editors, agents, iournalists, publishers, poets, storytellers, playwrights, cultural producers, freelance writers, teachers, academics and critics. We strive to support every member and provide them with opportunities to write, publish and create. We are the caretakers of Queensland's community of writers-maintaining, upgrading and introducing members to a web of connections that would otherwise go unknown.

Queensland Writers Centre is part of the National Writers' Centre Network - Australia's largest network of writers. The network supports and connects writers in all the states and territories of Australia. Together we represent more than 10,000 members and a much broader constituency of early career, emerging and established authors - across all genres, all styles and all parts of Australia. We work to create sustainable careers for Queensland writers with the assistance of our major partners - the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland and the Australian

Government through the Australia Council for the Arts. Through workshops, seminars, masterclasses and mentorships, as well as pop-up events and writing sessions, we aim to get our members writing great stories and being part of an amazing, diverse community. At the Queensland Writers Centre, we love stories. We love the way they help us to understand and connect with those around us and gain a greater understanding of ourselves. Most importantly, we love the writers who tell the stories and the readers who give them life.

PROJECTS

With a mission statement encouraging innovation and creative response, Queensland Writers Centre has led the field with calls to writing action through residencies, the use of technology, and working closely with alumni and the broader writing community.



TELLING OUR STORIES TO THE WORLD

In 2019, the Central West region of Queensland was challenged by drought and flood. The community-initiated project 'Telling Our Stories to the World' encouraged local people to respond to these challenges by tapping into their creativity, and sharing their wealth of stories with audiences outside the region.

QWC put community members in touch with creative writing teachers, editors and mentors. Participants discovered how a simple postcard can build a bridge between two strangers a world apart; that meeting with other community members to sit and write can break the cycle of isolation; and that children are often the most eager to share their stories with the world.



QUILLS DAY

Queensland Writers Centre values its history, and the people who've worked hard over years and decades to make our organisation what it is today. From 2020 onwards we'll be celebrating Quills Day every year on the 1st of August. Quills Day is a chance to recognise our Honorary Life Members, thank them for the contributions they've made to the culture of reading and writing in Queensland, and forge rich, meaningful connections between past, present and future.



FISH BOWL RESIDENCY

The FishBowl Residency has been established to help emerging writers develop their potential, particularly if they have experienced disadvantage or discrimination, or would not otherwise be able to access dedicated writing time and space. The FishBowl Residency is a ten week residency offering a private writing space, mentoring and support, and opportunities for the writer to showcase their work.

Tess Rowley was the FishBowl Writing Resident for 2019 and completed her residency in early late 2019. Tess is currently engaged in the first edit of her new novel.



WQ MAGAZINE

This year WQ featured a number of authors including Liz Kuiper, Amanda Niehaus and Shelley Davidow, as well as poetry by Samuel Wagan Watson, Jessica Wilkinson and Anna Jacobson. Our covers featured artwork by Christine Sharp, Anna Di Mezza, George Levi and Anna Jacobson.

Our relationship with social justice enterprise Barbed Design continues to flourish. While the process is far more involved than in the usual designer/ publisher relationship, the effort is worth the difference it makes to the lives of so many people. We also opened our pages to the membership and featured writing from our emerging writers - for many, their first opportunity for publication. As a member-based organisation it is a privilege for us to be able to create these experiences.



WRITING FRIDAYS

Now in its second year, Writing Fridays has taken off, with sessions being held as far afield as Longreach, Winton, Tambo, Barcaldine, Blackall, Bundaberg, Gympie and Gladstone.

Writers come together in libraries and community spaces to write their own work, using the Pomodoro Technique to structure the writing time. The Maleny, Helensvale and the State Library of Queensland events have now passed their first birthdays. Sessions are managed by a network of supportive volunteers network.

Our numbers in most centres are at capacity, and more importantly we have helped our members reach some major writing goals.



LIVE STREAMING

As a statewide organisation, our mission encompasses all of regional and rural Queensland. We aim to deliver high-quality services to writers everywhere, but it can be challenging to reach everyone in person. Live streaming has been successful in helping members, regional libraries, and the general public, connect with QWC's workshops and content.

Tutors based in different parts of Queensland can now offer workshops and webinars without needing to travel, which promotes greater connectivity throughout our membership base. Samantha Wheeler facilitated our first session back in April 2019 and we haven't looked back since, with over 200 people participating in these sessions through the year.

INDUSTRY

PARTNERSHIPS

Queensland Writers Centre partnered with the following industry organisations in 2019 to deliver exciting events and opportunities to our community.

QUEENSLAND COUNCILS

QWC continues to work with libraries, supported by local councils, to create opportunities for workshops and talks across the state. Council support makes it possible to fund a variety of writers for library events throughout the year. In providing many of these events at no cost to the public, people who often couldn't otherwise afford these events are able to explore various aspects of creative writing.

In addition, our writers gain valuable exposure. The Regional Arts Development Fund allows us to work with community groups and individuals from regional areas to undertake creative writing endeavours. This year, for example, Gladstone Area Writers Group in partnership with Queensland Writers Centre, secured funding to hold a weekend long writing workshop in 2020.

Through support such as this, local councils around the state send a message about the value of creative expression and storytelling



ROTARY LONGREACH

'Telling Our Stories To The World' wouldn't be possible without the vision and commitment of our project partner Rotary Longreach. Collaborating with Queensland Health and Queensland Writers Centre, Rotary formed an essential part of this new chapter of the Centre's work. Moving into new areas, supporting communities in non-traditional ways, and

making the arts part of a process of creative recovery, required Rotary to take a risk. The strength of our partnership made it a risk worth taking. We are proud to be in partnership with Rotary and look forward to future collaborations that will benefit from the learnings and experiences of the 'Telling Our Stories To The World' project.



QUT Internships, Panels & Research Division

Our existing relationship with QUT has seen us working with creative industries students across a range of different areas that formed a natural fit with QWC. But areat relationships ao bevond the expected to find new and different ways to grow alongside each other. Our focus with QUT has seen us working on grants that will further explore the power of creative recovery and storytelling

as a means of capturing the lived experience of diverse groups. Future collaborations will allow collation of research findings to establish the effectiveness of the arts, and writing in particular, in previously unexplored areas. We are excited to partner with QUT and look forward to finding creative ways to benefit the broader community.

GenreCon.

Australia's largest biennial writers' conference dedicated to all things genre fiction, GenreCon 2019 saw a refreshed brand identity and focussed on growing connections among writers in the Australian genre community.

GenreCon 2019 was a big success, with over 200 writers, editors, agents and publishers joining us for more than 30 panels, workshops and events over three days of celebrating genre.

The schedule also included the brand new Longest Book Launch and GenreCon Night Markets, which together showcased the works of more than 30 Australian authors & artists across a broad range of genres & backgrounds.











CREATIVE

RECOVERY

In the land of 'drought and flooding rains', struggles with the weather are nothing new. Regional and rural Australians have a proud history of creatively transforming such struggles into artistic works that express personal experience, connect community, and resonate with audiences beyond the local region.

In 2018 and 2019, many areas of Queensland suffered drought, bushfires, cyclones and/ or floods. Governments, Councils and the general public are beginning to recognise the negative impacts that challenging weather and natural disasters can have on mental health and wellbeing, in the short term and over time.

Queensland Writers Centre is well positioned to help individuals and communities tap into creativity and narrative as vital resources for coping with and recovering from natural disasters.

'Writing for Wellbeing', 'Community Resilience'. Recovery' 'Creative 'Regional Development' are not just buzz-words. They're ways of talking about how important it is to get through tough times by telling stories about them. Writing can help connect us to who we really are, our strengths, our capacity to survive and thrive. Local history is a treasure. Creativity is a resource. Our unique perspectives are worth celebrating.

STORIES

We love celebrating the wins with each member of the Queensland Writing community. 2019 saw our members busy achieving inspiring outcomes.



CAYLIE JEFFERY

We were so proud to see member and tutor, Caylie Jeffery, awarded the 2019 John Oxley Library Community History Award for her Under the Lino project. The award was the culmination of an amazing community writing project and testament to Caylie's dedication and commitment.

Inspired by the discovery of bankbooks and money under the lino flooring of her 1912 Queenslander, Caylie created a community-based research project that brought together people with similar stories and interests. Caylie first shared her discovery on Facebook's Old Brisbane album, where hints about her home began to emerge. In uncovering the mystery behind her find a community evolved, and a book was created to document and share this important part of Queensland's cultural heritage.

Caylie accepted the award at the official Queensland Memory Awards ceremony, held at the State Library in May. The Community History Award is part of a range of research fellowships and awards presented annually as part of the Queensland Memory Awards. The Award recognises Caylie's contribution to the investigation, preservation and celebration of Queensland's rich history.

We were very fortunate to have Caylie and fellow history buff, Marianne Taylor - the House Detective – speak to a packed room as part of our In Conversation series.



AIKI FLINTHART

Aiki is a successful hybrid author who first achieved success with her 80AD young adult series which became a selfpublishing success story. She is now the author of 13 published

speculative fiction novels, one non-fiction book and several short stories in anthologies and e-mags. She has been shortlisted in the Australian Aurealis Awards for Speculative Fiction, and was a top-8 finalist in the USA Writers of the Future Competition.

After traditional publishing offers, Aiki chooses to selfpublish for the control it gives her over her writing. She continues to be an outstanding example of self-publishing success. Her signing by agent Selwa Anthony is testament to this success. Aiki's work was selected as a finalist in our own Adaptable program and she will pitch her novel, Blackbirds Sing, in 2020.


AUDITOR'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT

Strategies implemented during 2019 ensured greater expense control and foundation building leading to 75% of budgeted surplus.

I am pleased to present Queensland Writers Centre Financial Report for the year ended 31 December 2019 on behalf of the Management Committee. Overall the Financial result for the year 2019 was an increase on the 2018 results.

During the year under review, Queensland Writers Centre reported a surplus of \$4311 (2018: loss \$60,004) and net cash balances of \$81,453 (2018: \$77,141).

The Balance Sheet reports total assets of \$164,373 (2018: \$337,919) and total liabilities of \$82,919 (2018: \$260,778) with total net assets equating to \$81,453 (2018: \$77,141).

The Income Statement reports total revenue of \$825,132 (2018: \$630,520). Revenue was made up of earned income of \$354,410 (2018: \$287,193) grants of \$470,417 (2018: \$341,962 which includes QLA), investment income of \$433.76 (2018: \$548) and sponsorship and fundraising income of \$14.34 (2018: \$817)

Total expenses of \$820,352 (2018: \$690,524).



We believe it is a partnership with outstanding long term potential and sees QWC expanding its regional presence even further, as well as strengthening Adaptable standing as a true industry



QLD HEALTH - TRAIC

Tackling Regional Adversity Integrated Care through (TRAIC) is a Queensland Health initiative in nine Hospital and Health Services across the state, including the Central West Hospital and Health Service, working to reduce psychological distress regional, rural and remote populations impacted the drought, disasters and other adversity. One the program achieves this is through the community grants program.

Following a co-design workshop with TRAIC, the Rotary club of Longreach and Queensland Writers Centre were awarded funding and are now on the way to achieving TRAIC grant objectives through their 'Telling our Stories to the World' initiative.
